Dear Parents & Carers,

Some of the children were also interviewed by our pupil leaders and gave some excellent recommendations.





This week has been science week and my thanks go out to all the teachers for organising and pulling together whilst Mrs Bradley our science lead is away to make this week happen and run so smoothly. There have been a variety of experiments from learning about how are brain works to rocket launching that have really enriched the children's education.

A further thankyou to those of you taking part in the big plastic count – this year the school council's number one goal is to: **Improve the school's approach to environmental issues by joining the WAR on WASTE initiative and help us to achieve the eco flag award.** Something we are on the way to achieving.

I just wanted to remind everyone especially in years 3,4 and 5 of the importance of practice in times tables and that children are regularly practising at home – we recommend 10 minutes at least 4 times a week.

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Each newsletter I try to include an explanatory note on an aspect of teaching and learning. In the run up to parent's evening, I wanted to write to give you insight into assessment and how we do this in school. Fundamentally and overwhelmingly the most important aspect of this is formative assessment (teacher speak for: the little moments that teachers build into the everyday). Asking a question in a lesson – checking pupil work, listening to their learning conversations related to a problem, low stakes quizzing etc... the list goes on. Fundamentally, this is teachers knowing their children's learning needs and adapting to them. The other aspect is summative assessment – this is the more traditional type. These happen termly in our school and look very different depending on year groups and the time of year especially for younger children whose experience looks very different. These assessments allow us to benchmark against national standards and track through statistical data how pupils are getting on. This is through a 'standardised score' which gives a banding in which pupils sit. We are fully aware of and take into account children's different needs relating to assessments – we are a school that want children to feel safe and comfortable. We seek to raise self esteem and empower at all times even when faced with challenge – growth mindset and the learning pit are powerful analogies we use to help children feel confident. Our star characteristic of positivity is also a powerful vehicle for this. In summary, at parent's evening, the judgement that your teacher's make is based on the combination of these things but fundamentally takes into account everything they know and discuss with you about your child.

Online safety: Thank you to all the parents who attended the workshop run by the NSPCC on Wednesday evening. We hope it was informative and useful. The key advice is included later in the newsletter.

In the last two weeks of term, we have the school Spring hikes to engage the children in map skills and offer an opportunity for physical exercise, our play and fun leaders are busy organising another PE enrichment day and The Dog's Trust are visiting.

Online Safety

Thank you to all the parents who attended the NSPCC online safety workshop on Wednesday 13th March.

Here are some key pieces of information;

- Monitor what your child is accessing/viewing = Set Parental controls on all devices - mobile and device providers can provide information on how to do this or there is advice via the NSPCC website below.
- Ensure computers, tablets etc are used in communal rooms where you can see what your child is accessing. If possible share your child's online experience talking to them about what they are doing or playing an online game.
- Be aware of what you are sharenting Sharenting refers to the practice of parents, caregivers or relatives sharing information about their children (underage) online, typically on some online platforms. This can include photos, videos, personal stories, and other updates about the child's life.

Pre-School Science Experiment

We took part in a science experiment for Science Week. A thin layer of milk was put in a tray to which we added drops of food colouring. This created swirly patterns which we thought looked like a jelly fish and a brain! We used a cotton bud dipped in washing up liquid to create further patterns and saw new colours appear.
