



## What was life like in Britain during the Stone Age?

Children are introduced to the idea that people have been living in Britain for a long time. They learn what life was like in Britain when the first people lived here, about their houses, art, religion and culture. Children will engage in historical enquiries, using archaeological evidence which will enable them to reason about the past.

- What can we learn from life in the Stone Age from a study of Skara Brae?
- Why was Stonehenge built?

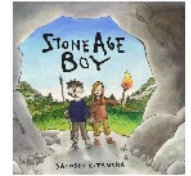
### Suggested texts to read at home with your children :

Dotted through the book are step-by-step craft activities and recipes that give you first-hand experience of some vital Stone Age skills – making a Mesolithic shelter, fat lamps, a digging stick, creating cave art, making a bow and arrow and a fishing hook are just a few.

Travel 20,000 years into the past and discover what life as a caveman was like in this prehistoric picture book by a prodigiously talented artist.. One day a little boy is walking along when he trips, stumbles and falls ... into the Stone Age! He meets a girl his own age and her tribe, and learns all about their way of life.
