Curriculum Overview Year 3 summer 1: Ancient Egyptians



In this unit we will learn about how archaeologists discovered ruins and tombs full of Egyptian artefacts which tell us about their culture. and religious beliefs. We will learn why people chose to settle in certain areas of Egypt and what Egyptian life was like for different groups of people. We will compare what was happening in the Egyptian civilisation with what was

happening in Britain at the same time, comparing aspects of life such as achievements, society, beliefs, and architecture. We will also look at what the similarities and differences, are with other ancient civilisations.


